### D1: My heart ... His Justice

Remember to always carefully consider the wider context of each passage below.

1. From the following passages, what does it mean that "God is just"? **Psalms 28:3-5; Isaiah 59:17-19; Jeremiah 16:14-18; Jeremiah 51:24; 1 Thessalonians 1:6-8; 1 Peter 3:18.** Make as many observations as you can about God in light of His justice.

2. Our sin renders every one of us guilty before our holy God. Write down what the following passages tell us about man's attempt to justify himself: **Isaiah 64:6; Romans 3:19,20; 4:1,2; Galatians 2:15.** Why is our best attempt unacceptable to God?

3. Read the following passages and write down what it is that justifies a sinner before God: **Romans 3:21-26; 4:3-5; 5:1,9; 1 Corinthians 6:11; Titus 3:7; James 2:21-25**. Be sure to take note of the James passage that mentions Abraham and Rahab.

4. Read the following passages and write down what God demands of believers in the area of justice: **Proverbs 21:3; Isaiah 1:16,17; Micah 6:6-8; Colossians 4:1; Titus 1:8**. In what ways is this similar to God's justice, and in what ways is it different?
5. What opportunities do you have to impart justice to those around you? Are there some in your own home towards whom you need to be more just? What about at work? Are there any cautions you need to keep in mind as you consider this?
6. Have you ever taken time to think through your justified position before God? Ponder God's grace that, despite once being hopelessly bound to your sin and God's judgment of that sin, you now stand justified before God because of the work of Jesus at the cross. Write out a short prayer expressing your response to God's kindness to you.
